 Map the route that Sara Bard Field and her companions drove from San Francisco, CA to Washington, DC. If you were to take that same route, what changes would you make? How would you go about publicizing the movement?

Deeds Not Words, pages 36-38

 Compare the philosophies and strategies of these three groups: National American Woman Suffrage Association, Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage and National Woman's Party.
